







Phonemic Awareness

Why is phonemic awareness important?

Phonemic awareness is one of the foundational skills that makes reading possible. In Scarborough's Reading Rope, it falls under phonological awareness, which is the broader ability to hear and manipulate sounds in spoken language. Phonemic awareness focuses on the smallest units of sound, called phonemes, and it's the most critical skill for helping students connect what they hear to what they see in print.

Phonemic Awareness

Here are three big takeaways about phonemic awareness instruction from Melissa & Lori Love Literacy podcast straight from the voices of researchers and real classrooms:

1

Connect Sound to Print

Phonemic awareness is essential, but it's most effective when it's connected to print. Research shows that pairing sounds with letters, through Elkonin boxes, letter tiles, or blending and segmenting with print, helps students map sounds to spelling and set a strong base for future reading.

2

Teach with Intention

Forget "letter of the week" routines and isolated drills. Instead, weave letter names, sounds, and phonemic awareness together in meaningful, connected ways. Students learn best when alphabet instruction is integrated, interactive, and focused on patterns that matter for reading and writing.

3

Make It Routine

Phonemic awareness grows through consistent, predictable practice. Short, daily routines, like quick blending and segmenting drills, help students internalize sound patterns and build lasting reading fluency.



Together, these practices help students connect spoken sounds to print, building a foundation for fluent reading and writing. The episodes feature insights from researchers and educators like Matt Burns, Mary Dahlgren, and Lindsay Kemeny. You'll find practical, evidence-based strategies you can try tomorrow, like integrating letters into phonemic awareness lessons and using sound walls and Elkonin boxes.



While the focus is on alphabet instruction, Shayne explains how learning letter names and sounds connects directly to phonemic awareness, which is the foundation for mapping spoken sounds to print.






